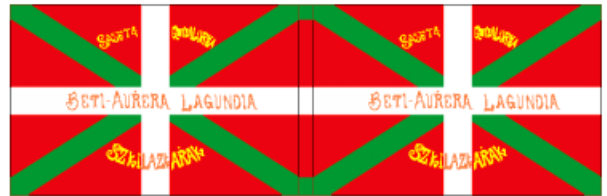

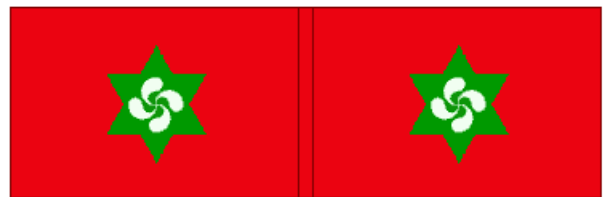

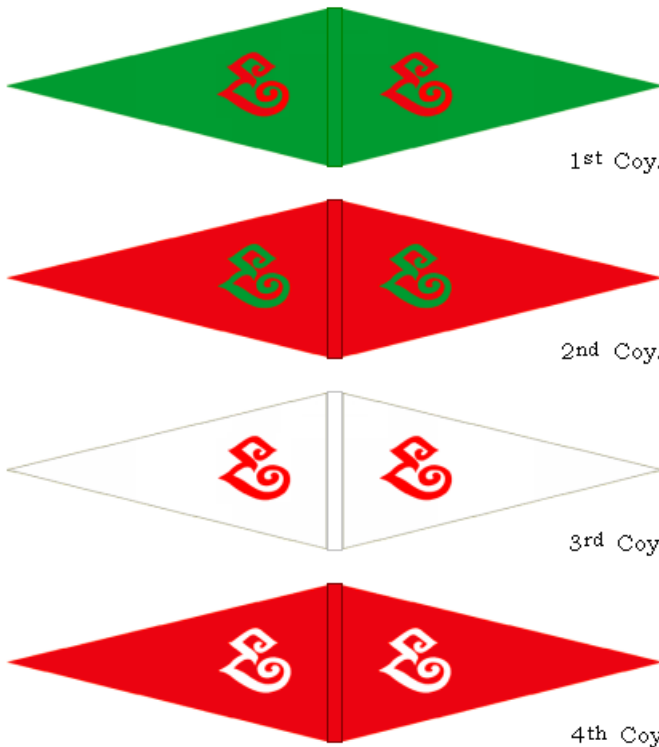

About the Basque Svastika, or "Lauburu"

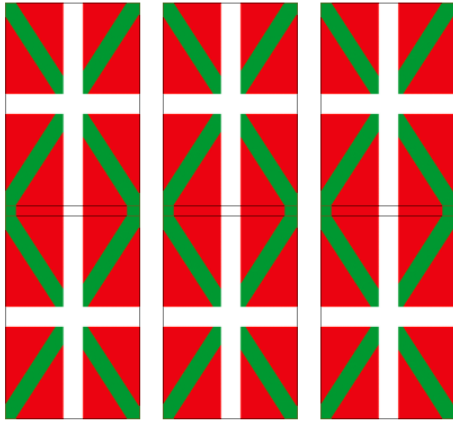

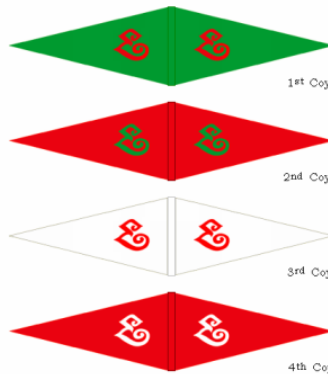
